Coronavirus Vaccine Distribution Plans

It was announced today that the coronavirus vaccine has been distributed to 11 health systems in North Carolina that have ultra-low temp freezers for staging purposes (prepositioning of assets to speed distribution). Cone Health is in phase one of the distribution plan and will receive vaccine from the prepositioned stockpiles 24-72 hours after final FDA approval.

Cone Health expects to begin offering vaccinations to its employees the week of December 14. The first employees to receive the vaccine has been determined based on the CDC's recommended priority for giving the vaccine, and vaccinations will be optional for eligible employees.

Virus Continues to Spread

Cone Health saw **another record total number of COVID-19 patients** in our facilities over the weekend: 172 for the Friday-Saturday midnight patient census and 173 for the Saturday-Sunday midnight patient census. Approximately 85 patients were at the Green Valley Campus COVID specialty hospital. The rest of the patients were at other facilities.

In anticipation of the potential increase in patients, Cone Health continues to convert more rooms to be able to provide HEPA-filtered negative pressure and continues to carefully monitor the projections for how many rooms we will need for COVID patients.

Cases continue to increase, both throughout North Carolina and in Cone Health's service area. Almost all counties in North Carolina are experiencing a reproduction number greater than 1.0, which means the number of people with the virus is increasing. (As a reminder, an overall reproduction number of 1.0 means that each person with the virus spreads it, on average, to one other person.)

Current reproduction estimates for <u>Alamance</u>, <u>Guilford</u>, <u>Randolph</u>, and <u>Rockingham</u> Counties appear immediately below and are available at

coviddata.conehealth.com. The "SARS-CoV-2 Spread by County" graphic below shows which North Carolina counties are experiencing an increase (in orange) or decrease (in blue) in the spread of the virus.

Enhanced Enforcement of Visitation Policy

With COVID-19 cases rising, all Cone Health staff have been reminded about the importance of strictly enforcing all aspects of our COVID-19 visitor policies, which are designed to protect our patients and staff, as well as our visitors.

Here are some important considerations:


- Masks for visitors are required at all times in all Cone Health facilities, including at all times in patient rooms.
- An adult COVID-19-negative patient may designate a single visitor or support person who will be allowed to visit during the patient's hospital stay.
 - Family members may <u>not</u> switch this designated support person at any time over the length of the patient's hospital stay. While we share the anguish of family members unable to visit loved ones, this policy is strictly required for the safety of our patients and staff.
- A designated visitor may leave and return to the hospital within the designated visiting hours.
- A designated support person may stay with a hospital patient beyond 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. visiting hours only when the patient's attending physician indicates this is necessary for the patient's cognitive or behavioral safety.

Exceptions to the above, including for minors, delivering mothers, and patients at end of life, are included on Cone Health's COVID-19 patient visitation webpage.

Please help Cone Health in our efforts to explain these rules, and the need for these rules, to our communities.

Chance of Catching COVID-19 Doubled Over Last Month

The likelihood of catching COVID-19 in the community doubled in the past month, and is expected to double (again) within another month. When going out, please continue to wear a mask, wash your hands, and watch your distance from others. And please consider limiting your exposure in other ways, if you can, like picking up dinner instead of dining out, ordering groceries for pickup or delivery, and working remotely.

ABSS Update: On Monday, October 26, the Alamance-Burlington Board of Education voted for Pre-K and Adapted Curriculum students to return to in-person learning beginning November 18. Pre-K students will attend class 5 days per week and Adapted Curriculum students will attend class based on their personalized learning schedule as determined by parents and teachers. Pre-K and Adapted Curriculum parents may choose for their child to continue on remote learning if that is their preference. All other K-12 students will remain on remote learning (Plan C) through January 15.
